Clinton staff says 'job not done'

Donald Trump has been elected president of the United States.


The Republican nominee won early today after capturing Wisconsin's 10 electoral votes, putting him over the 270 threshold, according to the AP.

The stunningly tight contest — and the prospect of the unpredictable Trump as president — left America and the world rattled like no election in modern times. Dow Jones futures plunged more than 800 points as traders nervously braced for a volatile Wednesday on Wall Street. Democrats were despairing at the idea of not just losing the White House, but the nation itself sliding into recession and civic unrest and possibly withdrawing from international commitments under a President Trump.

By 2 a.m. EST today, neither Trump nor Hillary Clinton had amassed the required 270 Electoral College votes to claim

the presidency. Trump, drawing bigger margins from blue-collar whites and rural voters than anticipated, defeated Clinton in the Democratic-leaning state of Pennsylvania as well as in Florida, the country's largest swing state. He clobbered her in Ohio.

Clinton's campaign chairman says it has nothing more to say even as votes turn against her.

John Podesta told a crowd in New York early Wednesday that with states still uncalled "we're not going to have anything else to say tonight."

Clinton trails in the Electoral

College count and Donald Trump is close to breaking the 270-vote threshold to become president.

Podesta told the crowd Clinton "has done an amazing job" and "is not done yet."

To the shock of Clinton and her advisers, who had confidently predicted victory through much of the day, the race veered out of control as sharp demographic splits by race, class, and geography put several battleground states out of reach. She won a narrow

Utah stays with GOP, picks Trump

SALT LAKE CITY — Republican Donald Trump is the winner in Utah, The Associated Press projected, as state election results showed him leading with 45 percent of the vote shortly before midnight Tuesday.

Democrat Hillary Clinton had 29 percent of the vote, with independent candidate Evan McMullin at 21 percent.

Utah GOP Chairman James Evans said Utahns are "trying to get back to the basics of government actually being there on behalf of the American people instead of being in the way of the American people."


The Utah party leader, who has pushed hard for a Trump victory in the state, said the billionaire businessman "speaks his mind. A lot of people don't like that, but I think that's what we need at this time."

Utah Democratic Party Chairman Peter Corroon wasn't ready Tuesday night to react to a Trump victory in the state.

"We still have Utahns waiting in lines at the polls," he said.

A longtime Clinton supporter, Salt Lake County Councilwoman Jenny Wilson, said the former secretary of state's team "worked hard in a very fluid and interesting election year and are disappointed we fell short."

In his concession speech, McMullin told a crowd of supporters gathered at The Depot

that "the fight does not end tonight" and asked them to be part of "a new conservative movement that will stand for the rights and liberties" of Americans.

Love headed to win over Owens

SALT LAKE CITY — Republican Rep. Mia Love took an early lead over Democratic challenger Doug Owens as election results in the 4th Congressional District started to trickle in Tuesday.

Love led Owens 51 percent to 44 percent with some Salt Lake County results in as of

11:25 p.m.

Both candidates declined to speak to the media until more definitive numbers were available.

Some national nonpartisan groups rated the race a toss-up earlier this year. But what had been seen as one of the state's hottest contests was largely overshadowed by the presidential election.

Love refused to endorse or

vote for GOP presidential nominee Donald Trump and eventually called for him to withdraw. She said she would reveal her vote for president on election night. Owens voted for Democrat Hillary Clinton.

The first black Republican woman in Congress and considered a rising star by
